### Rabbi's Column: A Busy Return to the Fold



I had an excellent "first month" at MCJC—first month returning as your Rabbi, that is. Our farewell service for Rabbi Donni was full of spirited singing and words of appreciation, followed by time to sit and talk together over a meal. Our "first" Shabbat morning service in-

cluded a thoughtful discussion on Joseph and leadership, with the Haftarah chanted beautifully by Jaci Krandel.

Many old and new members celebrated Chanukah together and participated in a serious discussion about the future of MCJC. My takeaway is that each of us appreciates our community, and however we proceed, spending time together in Jewish community is important to every one of us.

Our Jewish community has been enhanced this past year by the presence of three people participating in worship and celebration with us while studying to convert to Judaism. Melissa Ragusin, a resident of McHenry, began studying with me in the fall of 2022 while she was a student at MCC. She is now working on her fine arts degree at the University of Illinois in Chicago, and brings her creativity and deep thinking to our discussions.

Adam and Alexander Moliwell, a married couple who live in Harvard, continued their journey to

Judaism by studying in the Conversion to Judaism Class I started here last winter. They are both teachers in District 46. Adam is a high school librarian and Alex is a music teacher, and both just finished work on their masters degrees. They have already used their skills to enhance our congregation, with Alex participating in the music aspect of our services and Adam repairing many of our prayer books. Stay tuned as Alex puts together an instrumental group to enhance our worship and Adam eyes a position on our Board!

Their trip to the mikvah will take place the first week of January, and you are all invited to participate in welcoming the three to our congregation as members of the Jewish people on Friday night, January 5. At our Kabbalat Shabbat service at 6:30 pm, we will welcome them and hear a few words from each of them. This will be followed by a Shabbat dinner (dairy) to celebrate together. 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### **MCJC Loses Two Old Friends**

MCJC recently lost two long-time members and friends with the passing of Herb Franks and Willa Wertheimer. May their memories be for a blessing.



#### Herbert H. Franks, who passed away on Oct. 31 at the age of 89, was a founding member of MCJC, and one of its biggest supporters. Herb was many things to many people. As it notes on his tombstone, he was a farmer, lawyer, and visionary. He liked to say he was

just a pig farmer from Marengo, but his status and contacts extended far beyond McHenry County to the halls of the U.S. Congress. Many dignitaries attended and spoke at his funeral, including U.S. Senator Dick Durbin who flew in from DC the night before the funeral to eulogize his old friend.

To the members of MCJC, Herb was a congregational patriarch. He could be found "ruling the roost" on the back bench of the sanctuary during the High Holidays surrounded by his family. His d'var Torah on Jonah on Yom Kippur was an annual favorite. Herb was a regular "minyanaire" on Saturday mornings, and he would frequently round up a group of fellow worshipers to join him for lunch after services. Herb did not suffer fools, and his wisdom, which he dispensed liberally, was often spiked with profanity. Forgivably old school, he loved to hug the ladies. He was generous to his congregation and to the Jewish community. He made it a priority to establish a Jewish cemetery in McHenry County and then made it happen. Herb now rests in the cemetery he and his beloved wife, Eileen, established in Woodstock.



Willa Wertheimer died too soon, on Dec. 3 at the age of 59. She was diagnosed with a rare form of cancer, leiomyoma sarcoma, in 2006, but it didn't keep her from living a full life. She was a well-respected clinical psychologist

who specialized in treating adults and children who experienced trauma. She worked up until her final weeks of life.

Willa had two sons, Maitiu and Liam, and a husband, Ed Groenendal, all of whom adored her, and she adored them in return. Willa was first and foremost a mother, noted Rabbi Gordon in her eulogy at Willa's funeral, though she had many talents including painting, scrapbooking, cooking, and writing poetry. According to Ed, Willa was in equal measures analytical, creative, and emotionally intelligent; a rare combination. Her sons and family members remarked on her wickedly witty sense of humor that she displayed even in her final days. Many at the funeral remarked on her innate compassion that made her such an effective therapist.

A military honor guard saluted and performed taps for Willa at her funeral, in recognition of the many traumatized local veterans Willa served and saved. Willa's final resting place is near Herb's, in the McHenry County Jewish Cemetery.

### **President's Report**

Over 50 people gathered for MCJC's Chanukah celebration on Dec. 10, representing former, long-term, and new members. The morning featured songs, crafts, cookie decorating, and, of course, steaming hot

potato latkes topped with applesauce and/or sour cream. The latkes were excellent, as prepared by the Maintenance Men (and other volunteers) who operate like a 'well-oiled' machine. Years of finetuning the process means that all cooking is done outside in the garage, leaving the air free to breathe within the building.

The morning also included a Town Hall, allowing members the chance to have a frank discussion about the synagogue's current financial shape and its long-term prospects. While I tend to be more optimistic than some about MCJC's future, it is important for us to weigh our options, as we currently are spending more than we are taking in. Some of the options we discussed were potentially merging with another congregation; allowing others to rent/use space in our building; selling our building and borrowing space as needed; and transitioning to a more informal/social havurah organization. We also discussed the future of the Religious School and options to permit our students to interact with others in other congregations.

The board will explore each of these options and share their findings at our next Town Hall on March 24 tied to the Purim celebration. The members will be given the opportunity to comment on future directions via a survey following the next Town Hall. Your comments and suggestions are always welcome.

#### **Other Transitions:**

MCJC experienced a changing of its spiritual guard in early December as it bid farewell to Rabbi Donni Aaron and welcomed back Rabbi Maralee Gordon. In a kiddush in Rabbi's Donni's honor, we thanked her for her service to MCJC. The MCJC Board determined that we lacked the resources to continue her contract through its fiscal year. Fortunately, Rabbi Gordon will be able to provide rabbinical services to us on a part-time basis.

Our sincere thanks and best wishes to Sunshine **Roth** who recently moved with her husband Jay to Virginia to be closer to family. For the last couple of years, Sunshine's sweet voice was the first one people who were seeking information on MCJC heard since she chaired membership. She also served on the MCJC Board and helped around the congregation in many ways. During Covid, she did much to create a sense of community, if only virtually. Sunshine will be very much missed.



#### Final 2023 MCJC CROP Hunger Walk Team Report

MCJC participated in the 2023 McHenry County Crop Walk alongside seven other McHenry County faith congregations: Algonquin Christ United Methodist Church, Crystal Lake Bethany Lutheran Church of Christ, Cary United Methodist Church, Crystal Lake First Church, Ridgefield Crystal Lake Presbyterian Church, Grayslake Living Waters Assembly of God Church, and Crystal Lake St. Paul's United Church of Christ.

The Walk took place on October 1, and the one mile-walk began at Cary United Methodist Church. The 2023 MCJC CROP Hunger Walk Team members included Davina/Andrew/Sienna Kelly...Scott/Olivia/Layla Schwartz...Jonah/Asher Markowitz...and Bruce Weiss.

The 2023 McHenry County CROP Hunger Walk raised \$18,750, and the MCJC Team raised \$581. Twenty-five percent of the money raised will be split evenly among the following local food pantries: Crystal Lake Food Pantry, Algonquin/Lake In The Hills Interfaith Food Pantry, Grafton Food Pantry, and the Cary Food Pantry. Seventy-five percent of the money raised will be used by CWS CROP to help alleviate hunger in third world countries.



### WOODSTOCK DRIVE-THRU FOOD PANTRY

Members of the MCJC community helped out at the October 23 and November 20 Woodstock Drive-Thru Food Pantry food distribution days. Muriel Pick, Linda Trachsler, Rabbi Maralee Gordon, Lizz & John Dewey, and Bruce Weiss helped out on October 23, and Muriel Pick, Lou Dolmon, Linda Trachsler, Paula Eskoz, and Bruce Weiss helped out on November 20. The MCJC mobile food pantry team members worked alongside volunteers from St. Ann's Episcopal Church, Grace Lutheran Church, Resurrection Catholic Church, First Presbyterian Church, and the Woodstock High School Service Club.

On Oct. 23, 227 families received boxes of food, and 273 families received boxes of food on November 20. As of that date, 4,313 families have received food from the Woodstock Drive-Thru Food Pantry during calendar year 2023. The Woodstock Mobile Food Pantry is a



joint venture between the McHenry County Faith Leaders Food Collaborative and the Northern Illinois Food Bank. The pantry is located in the parking lot directly across the street from Woodstock High School at 501 W. South Street in Woodstock. MCJC community members help out at the Woodstock Drive-Thru Food Pantry on the third Monday of each month from 3:00 pm to 5:30 pm. 

MCJC's Book Club meets approximately every other month to discuss Jewishthemed literature and is open to all.


The Heaven & Earth Grocery Store is, according to the New York Times, "A murder mystery locked inside a Great American Novel...charming, smart, heart-blistering and
