Rabbi's Column: Celebrating Spring



It sure feels like winter, and the calendar concurs, but now is the time to focus on Spring Holidays! Purim is just a lot of fun, and this year at MCJC will be no exception, with Paula Eskoz and crew concocting another brilliant, hilarious Purim shpiel. Purim is the prime example of the

Jewish holiday paradigm: They (boo Haman) tried to kill us/we survived (with the help of Esther and Mordechai)/let's eat.

What's your favorite hamantaschen filling? Hopefully you'll find some you love after our Megillat Esther reading/Purim shpiel on Sunday morning, March 24th starting at 10 am, and followed by a Town Hall discussion when we will consider options on the future of our congregation and its building.

How will we observe the Purim mitzvah of providing food and drink to those in need? You can donate to: Mazon (Hebrew word for "food"), the organization that collects monetary donations from Jewish communities around the country to address food insecurities here and around the world for all peoples; or you can donate to your local food pantry.

Fast forward one month, to Passover. The paradigm is slightly different, more like: They (Pharaoh and the Egyptians) tried to keep us enslaved/we escaped (with the help of Moses, Miriam and Aaron)/let's EAT (with no leavening). In many ways Passover is the most important seasonal Holy Day of our calendar. The account of our people's journey from slavery to freedom is foundational on these levels:

Humility: Rather than trace our lineage to royalty, we acknowledge our roots as having been oppressed and enslaved.

Gratitude: In telling our story we are thankful for every step of the process. Dayenu spells this out—If God had brought us out of Egypt and not parted the Reed Sea for us, dayenu (it would have been enough). If God had split the Reed Sea for us and not given us manna to eat, dayenu. Etc.

Salvation/Redemption: Salvation according to Jewish teachings has already occurred for us. We were

redeemed from the oppression of slavery to Pharaoh in Egypt. Its corollary is:

Responsibility: Now that we have been redeemed, it is our responsibility to work to end the oppression of others.

Pass it on: We are told to relate the story of the exodus from Egypt to our children and to our children's children, L'dor Vador, from generation to generation a continuous chain of recounting our beginnings as a people.

Joy: At the Passover Seder we sing and laugh. The Haggadah tells us "Our story begins in degradation and ends in glory."

No wonder Passover is celebrated by more Jews than any other holiday! We pass on the values of humility, gratitude, responsibility, redemption, the generation-to-generation chain, and joy, in warm ceremony involving the best of Jewish food!

It's not too early to think about who you are going to invite to your seder or with whom you will celebrate. It's not too early to think about which Haggadah you will use, what new songs your will add, what new/old recipes you will use.

It is not too early to contribute to Maot Chitim, the local organization that provides Passover provisions to those who need assistance, or again, to Mazon, and/or volunteer to pack or deliver food for Passover on their website https://maotchitim.org/. When you clear out the chametz (leavened food stuffs) from your kitchen, unopened boxes of cereal, pasta, bread and baked goods can be taken to your local food pantry.

Stay tuned for details of how we will celebrate Passover at MCJC this year, with a second-night Seder, Tuesday, April 23rd. Will it be a potluck meal? A catered dinner? An appetizer Seder? However we eat, know that our Seder will include a retelling of our foundational story with much laughter, singing, reflection and joy.

MCJC Board Passes Resolution

At its February meeting, the MCJC board approved the following resolution: "MCJC will live on as a congregation serving the Jewish community of McHenry County." In other words, regardless of whether we sell the building, move, share space or programming with others, the Board is committed to preserving a Jewish presence in McHenry County as MCJC.

The Board is exploring several options and would like to share its findings thus far with the membership and solicit guidance. All members, past and current, are invited to attend a Town Hall on Sunday, March 24. The schedule for the morning is Purim Shpeil at 10 am followed by the Town Hall at 11.

MCJC DOCENT-LED TOUR OF THE ILLINOIS HOLOCAUST MUSEUM

MCJC is organizing a private 1.5-hour-docent-led walking tour of the Illinois Holocaust Museum in Skokie on Sunday, April 14. The cost per person is as follows: \$15 for adults (aged 23 to 64), \$12 for seniors (aged 65+), \$10 for youth (aged 12-22). Participants can bring a brown bag lunch. Deli lunches catered by "Once Upon A Deli" are also available for \$12 per person. Four choices of deli lunches are available:

- #1: deli mini sandwiches (includes: turkey, corned beef, egg salad)
- #2: vegetarian mini sandwiches (includes: egg salad, cheese, veggie cream cheese)
- # 3: gluten free deli salad (a scoop each of: egg salad, tuna salad, and chicken salad)
- #4: Vegan Garden Salad (green lettuce, tomato, cucumber, carrots with Balsamic dressing on the side)

All deli lunches include pickle, fresh fruit cup, cole slaw, bottled water, and a chocolate chip cookie.

The museum is located at 9603 Woods Drive, Skokie, IL. A rideshare program will be established in conjunction with this program. Once you sign up for this program, many more details pertaining to the rideshare program and the museum visit experience will be provided to you including museum rules and regulations.


